What is the Holy Bible?

The Holy Bible is a collection of writings that includes 66 books in English editions. The Bible consists of two parts, the Old Testament and New Testament. The word testament means covenant. The Old Testament includes 39 books, and the New Testament includes 27 books.

These 66 books were written over approximately 1,400 years by 40 different authors in Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek. The Old Testament writings were affirmed by Jewish leaders, and moreover, by Jesus Christ.¹ The New Testament writings were confirmed by early church leaders. The 66 books of the Bible are the inspired words of God that are used to make and mature disciples of the One true God through Jesus Christ, his Son ([Matthew 28:18-20](#), [2 Timothy 3:16-17](#)). The Bible was not created by mere human wisdom but was inspired by God ([2 Peter 1:20-21](#)), is interpreted by His Holy Spirit ([John 16:13](#), [Matthew 23:8-10](#)), and will last forever ([Matthew 24:35](#)).²

If you do a phrase search on the Bible you will find the phrase "the word of the Lord" and "Thus says the Lord" more than 700 times.³ In addition, this book has given reasonable evidence to the claim of being God's word by:

- providing answers that conform with the reality we see around us.
- being a reliable collection of historical documents.
- containing eyewitness accounts that were written during the lifetimes of other eyewitnesses.
- recording supernatural events that took place in fulfillment of specific prophecies.⁴

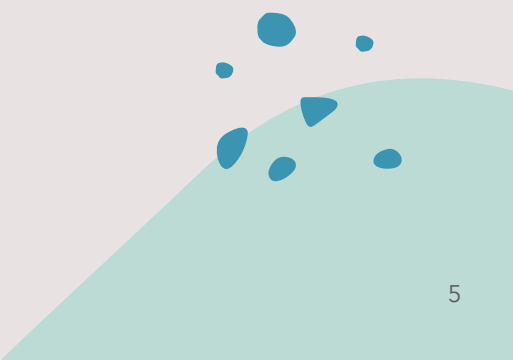

Opening Prayer Verse: 2 Corinthians

All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation."



Review of 1 Corinthians

Learning Tip: For those studying the Bible in its table-of-contents order, this slide gives you a brief recap of the book you just completed. Studying in a different sequence? You can simply skip this slide or treat it as a gentle nudge to circle back when the time is right.

Brief Summary: 1 Corinthians was written c. 55 A.D. from Ephesus while Paul was on his third missionary journey. Though this letter was written to correct various issues in the church at Corinth, Paul opens the letter by reminding the believers of their calling and many benefits in Christ Jesus. He tells them they have been set apart, called to be saints, and to receive grace and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. He reminds them that God has enriched them in Christ in all speech, knowledge, and fellowship and of God's promise to sustain them and present them guiltless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ ([1 Corinthians 1:1-9](#)).

After reminding the church of the benefits of their calling, Paul addresses the issues of the church. First, many believers in Corinth were dividing into groups loyal to certain spiritual leaders ([1 Corinthians 1:12](#); [3:1-6](#)) creating disunity in the church. Paul exhorted the Corinthian believers to not be foolishly arrogant, but to be united because of devotion to Christ who alone was crucified for their salvation ([1 Corinthians 1:13-31](#), [3:21-23](#)). Secondly, many in the church were essentially approving of a sexually immoral relationship ([1 Corinthians 5:1-2](#)). Paul commanded them to expel the wicked man from the church for the glory of Christ and the health of the flock ([1 Corinthians 5:13](#)).

Paul gave the Corinthian church instructions on settling disputes making it clear that conflicts should be settled within the church, and that it would be better to be taken advantage of than to damage one's Christian testimony ([1 Corinthians 6:3-8](#), [Matthew 18:15-20](#)). The apostle deals with marriage and celibacy in chapter 7 and then utilizes three chapters to address the issue of food sacrificed to idols and how to live out our Christian liberty in a way that glorifies God and seeks the good of others (chapters 8-10). Chapters 12-14 address church worship including roles, the Lord's communion table, the exercise of spiritual gifts, and how all should be done in love as God defines love ([1 Corinthians 13](#)).

Through Paul, the Holy Spirit begins the conclusion of the letter with the gospel, the crucial importance of Christ's resurrection, and the promise of our resurrection through Him ([1 Corinthians 15](#)). In [1 Corinthians 10:6](#), Paul writes "Now these things took place as examples for us, that we might not desire evil as they did." He wrote this after reminding the Corinthians about Israel's sinful behavior in the wilderness. With this letter to the Corinthians, we now have this example two-fold, from both Israel and the Corinthians so that we will not crave evil things but instead live as saints of God.

Connections: In [chapter 5](#) Paul takes us back to the Feast of Unleavened Bread and the Passover reminding the Church that Christ, our ultimate Passover Lamb, has been sacrificed, and we in turn, are to remove the leaven (i.e., sin) from our lives ([Exodus 12:15-20](#), [Leviticus 23:6-8](#)). Then in [chapter 10](#), Paul uses the story of the Israelites wilderness experience to illustrate to the Corinthian believers the folly of the misuse of freedom and the danger of overconfidence. The Israelites who, despite seeing God's miracles and care for them—the parting of the Red Sea, the miraculous provision of manna from heaven and water from a rock—misused their freedom, and displeased God through their rebellion, grumbling, idolatry, and immorality ([Numbers 11:4-6](#), [34](#), [25:1-9](#); [Exodus 16:2](#), [17:2](#), [32:1-6](#)). The Corinthian believers despite having the indwelling of the Holy Spirit and the benefits of grace, had fallen into these same sins. We too must take heed trusting God to enable us to endure; otherwise, we too will fall ([1 Corinthians 10:11-13](#)).

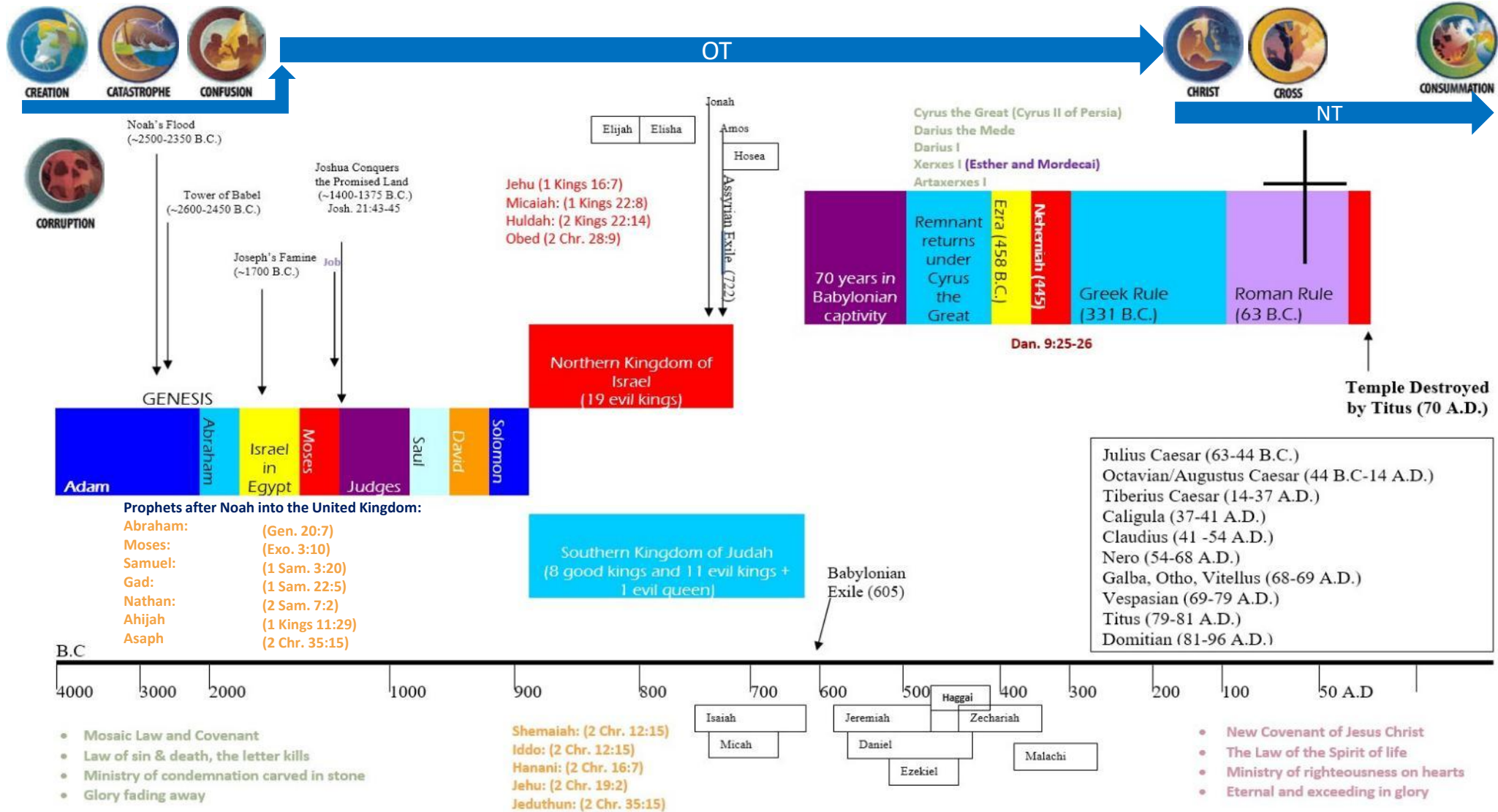

Timeline is not to scale

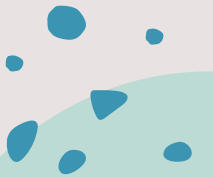

About this Book *and* Its Author - Paul

This is the second preserved letter to the Christians in the city of Corinth. That the Apostle Paul wrote 2 Corinthians is uncontested; the lack of any motive for a forger to write this highly personal, biographical epistle has led even the most critical scholars to affirm Paul as its author.

Several considerations establish a feasible date for the writing of this letter. Extrabiblical sources indicate that July, A.D. 51 is the most likely date for the beginning of Gallio's term as proconsul (cf. [Acts 18:12-13](#)). Paul's trial before him at Corinth ([Acts 18:12-17](#)) probably took place shortly after Gallio assumed office. Leaving Corinth after this (likely in A.D. 52) Paul sailed for Syria ([Acts 18:18](#)), thus concluding his second missionary journey. Returning to Ephesus on his third missionary journey (probably in A.D. 52), Paul ministered there for about 2 1/2 years ([Acts 19:1-10](#)). The apostle wrote 1 Corinthians from Ephesus toward the close of that period ([1 Corinthians 16:5-8](#)), most likely in A.D. 55. Since Paul planned to stay in Ephesus until the following spring¹, and 2 Corinthians was written after he left Ephesus, the most likely date for 2 Corinthians is late A.D. 55 or very early A.D. 56.

2 Corinthians – Background and Setting

Paul's association with the important commercial city of Corinth began on his second missionary journey when he spent 18 months ministering there ([Acts 18:1-18](#)). After leaving Corinth, Paul heard of immorality in the Corinthian church and wrote a letter (since lost) to confront that sin, referred to in [1 Corinthians 5:9](#). During his ministry in Ephesus, he received further reports of trouble in the Corinthian church in the form of divisions among them ([1 Corinthians 1:11](#)). In addition, the Corinthians wrote Paul a letter ([1 Corinthians 7:1](#)) asking for clarification on some issues. Paul responded by writing the letter known as 1 Corinthians. Planning to remain at Ephesus a little longer ([1 Corinthians 16:8-9](#)), Paul sent Timothy to Corinth.¹ Disturbing news reached the apostle (possibly from Timothy) of further difficulties at Corinth, including the arrival of self-styled false apostles ([2 Corinthians 11:12-13](#)).

To create the platform to teach their false gospel, they began by assaulting the character of Paul. They had to convince the people to turn from Paul to them if they were to succeed in preaching demon doctrine. Temporarily abandoning the work at Ephesus, Paul went immediately to Corinth. The visit known as the "painful visit" ([2 Corinthians 2:1](#)), was not a successful one from Paul's perspective; someone in the Corinthian church (possibly one of the false apostles) even openly insulted him ([2 Corinthians 10:10](#)). Saddened by the Corinthians' lack of loyalty to defend him, seeking to spare them further reproof (cf. [2 Corinthians 1:23](#)), and perhaps hoping time would bring them to their senses, Paul returned to Ephesus. From Ephesus, Paul wrote what is known as the "severe letter" ([2 Corinthians 2:1-4](#)) and sent it with Titus to Corinth ([2 Corinthians 7:5-16](#)).

Leaving Ephesus after the riot sparked by Demetrius ([Acts 19:23-20:1](#)), Paul went to Troas to meet Titus ([2 Corinthians 2:12-13](#)). But Paul was so anxious for news of how the Corinthians had responded to the "severe letter" that he could not minister there though the Lord had opened the door ([2 Corinthians 2:12](#)).² So he left for Macedonia to look for Titus ([2 Corinthians 2:12-13](#)). To Paul's immense relief and joy, Titus met him with the news that the majority of the Corinthians had repented of their rebellion against Paul ([2 Corinthians 7:5-16](#)). Wise enough to know that some rebellious attitudes still smoldered under the surface, and could erupt again, Paul wrote the Corinthians the letter called 2 Corinthians.³ In this letter, though the apostle expressed his relief and joy at their repentance ([2 Corinthians 7:8-16](#)), his main concern was to defend his apostleship ([2 Corinthians 1-7](#)), exhort the Corinthians to resume preparations for the collection for the poor at Jerusalem ([2 Corinthians 8-9](#)), and confront the false apostles head on ([2 Corinthians 10-13](#)). He then went to Corinth, as he had written ([2 Corinthians 12:14](#); [13:1-2](#)). The Corinthians' participation in the Jerusalem offering ([Romans 15:26-27](#)) implies that Paul's third visit to that church was successful.

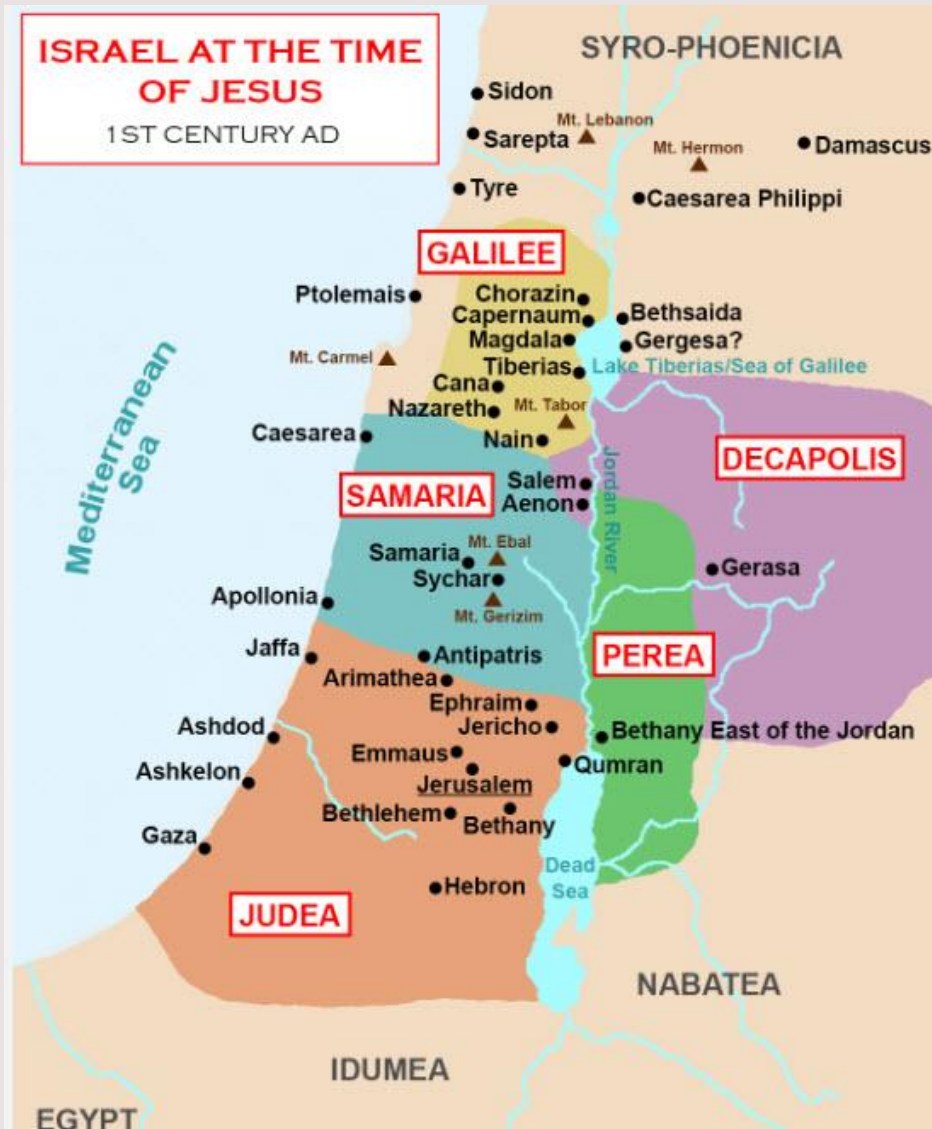

2 Corinthians 1:20: "For all the promises of God find their Yes in him. That is why it is through him [Jesus] that we utter our Amen to God for his glory."

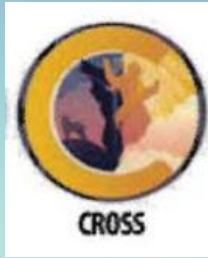

 - b. Most people put their treasured possessions in a fire-proof metal container, safe, or vault. Why do you think the Holy Spirit describes us as jars of clay containing treasure?
4. Because false teachers had infiltrated the Corinthian church, Paul laid out his credentials as an Apostle called directly by Jesus Christ to draw the church away from the clutches of these evil men. Most of his credentials consisted of the hardships he had endured while spreading the gospel. But in [2 Corinthians 12:2-7](#) we get a glimpse into one of his mountain top experiences. Read this passage and answer the questions below.
 - a. Paul noted he was caught up into the third heaven. Logic tells us that the first heaven is the sky we see above us (i.e., earth's atmosphere). What are the second and third heavens? (See [Genesis 1:16](#), [Psalm 19:1-3](#), and [Luke 23:43](#) for hints.)
 - b. In [2 Corinthians 12:7](#) what was the reason the Apostle Paul gave for why God gave him a thorn in his flesh?

2 Corinthians 5:9-10, "Therefore we also have as our ambition, whether at home or absent, to be pleasing to Him. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive compensation for his deeds done through the body, in accordance with what he has done, whether good or bad."

2 Corinthians – Summary

Brief Summary: Second Corinthians complements the historical record of Paul's dealings with the Corinthian church as recorded in [Acts 18](#) and [1 Corinthians](#). It also contains important biographical data on Paul throughout.

Although an intensely personal letter, written by the apostle in the heat of battle against those attacking his credibility, 2 Corinthians contains several important theological themes. In Paul's [greeting](#) alone he touches on the following theological matters:

1. Paul's apostleship in Jesus Christ by God's will.
2. The God and Father of our Lord Jesus is the Father of mercies and all comfort.
3. He is the God who delivered the apostles out of their afflictions causing them to rely not on themselves but on God who raises the dead.
4. This is the God on whom the true apostles had set their hope for continued deliverance.

After explaining his reasons for not making an earlier visit to them and how the church was to handle a repentant offender, Paul begins his defense against the false teachers, peddlers of God's word, who had infiltrated the church. He does this by first laying out the true gospel of Jesus Christ, the new covenant, in comparison to the old covenant. The text explains that the first covenant, the ministry of death, refers to the Law given to Moses, which God wrote on tablets of stone. It was glorious because the Law represents God's character, and Moses' face shone with this glory after being in God's presence. But this glory faded away, for the Law is condemning because it has no power to overcome sin. It is the Law of sin and death for us, the letter that kills, because we are sinners by birth and practice completely unable to be right before God. But the ministry of the Spirit is the new covenant that frees us from the Law of sin and death through Jesus Christ. God sent His only Son in human flesh to fulfill His Law and to be an offering for our sin. Through the Holy Spirit of Jesus Christ, the ministry of righteousness administers God's mercy, grace and love and makes us new creations with God's Law written upon our hearts. This is the permanent glory that will never fade and through which we are being transformed into the image of Jesus Christ ([2 Corinthians 3](#)).

Throughout the remainder of the letter Paul continues the defense of his ministry against the false apostles who were attempting to lead the Corinthians astray. He exhorts the Corinthians to open their hearts and be assured of his love for them and his apostolic authority. He calls himself a "fool" for having to reluctantly boast of his qualifications in conduct, suffering, and credentials including a vision of heaven ([2 Cor. 11-12](#)). Paul closes the letter with a warning for the Corinthians to examine themselves and ends with a benediction of love and peace.

Connections: Paul refers to the Mosaic law, comparing it with the surpassing greatness of the gospel of Jesus Christ and salvation by grace. The Law written on our hearts through Jesus Christ surpasses the Law written on tablets of stone ([2 Corinthians 3:4-11](#), [Exodus 24:12](#)).

Practical Application

This letter while heavily personal and biographical still provides a wide array of applications for the Christian life. It helps us discern a true messenger of God; which will be one whose life is dedicated to prayerfully teaching, living out, and even suffering to deliver the Truth of God's word. In addition, this ministry of reconciliation of sinners to God through Jesus Christ, has been handed down to all saints. We are to be ambassadors for Christ Jesus ([2 Corinthians 5:18-20](#)).

This epistle also provides examples of generosity to follow as Paul highlighted how the Macedonians gave both of themselves to the Lord and the apostles and of their worldly goods even in their own afflictions ([2 Corinthians 8:1-6](#)). Moreover, Paul writes that the ultimate example of sacrificial giving came from our Lord Jesus Christ who though he was rich became poor for our sakes ([2 Corinthians 8:8-11](#)). God loves a cheerful giver and promises that we will reap a benefit for everything we sow into His kingdom ([2 Corinthians 9:6-8](#)).

Other principles we find in this book include not being unequally yoked with unbelievers. Since we cannot expect unbelievers to desire to follow the ways of God ([Romans 8:7](#)), it is counterproductive to yoke ourselves in partnerships with them (i.e., business, deep friendships, marriage [unless already married; see [1 Corinthians 7:12-17](#)]). The Holy Spirit, through Paul, asks a series of rhetorical questions after commanding us not to be unequally yoked to demonstrate that only regret and sorrow can come from such unions ([2 Corinthians 6:14-18](#)). Paul wraps up this epistle with an exhortation to each of us to examine ourselves to see whether we are in the faith ([2 Corinthians 13:5](#)). Are we obeying the Lord in the understanding He has given us? Are we exhibiting the fruit of the Holy Spirit ([Galatians 5:22-23](#)) and growing in the qualities of Christ Jesus ([2 Peter 1:5-10](#))? Finally, Paul exhorts the believers to rejoice, comfort one another, agree with one another, and to live in peace.

As you read back through these possible applications, what is the Holy Spirit impressing upon your heart at this time in your life? Whatever it is, ask God to help you grow in that area.

Closing Prayer Verse

2 Corinthians 13:4-5, "For he was crucified in weakness, but lives by the power of God. For we also are weak in him, but in dealing with you we will live with him by the power of God. Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Or do you not realize this about yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you? – unless indeed you fail to meet the test!"



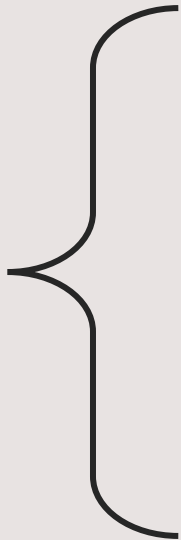

Sample Opening Prayer Verse: 2 Corinthians

2 Corinthians 5:17-19: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation."

Sample Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, we would have never thought to ask to be made new creations. Thank you that you have caused our old sinful lives to pass away, and by your Spirit have caused us to be born again in Christ Jesus. Thank you for not holding our sins against us and making peace for us through Jesus' sacrifice. Teach and empower us to carry this message of reconciliation to others so that they too may receive your forgiveness and abound in thanksgiving to you. We love you Lord and pray these things in Jesus' name. Amen



2 CORINTHIANS: STUDY QUESTIONS

1. In [2 Corinthians 2:5-11](#) we learn that a person the church had disciplined under Paul's instruction had repented. Read the passage and answer the questions below.
 - a. How does Paul now instruct the leaders of the church to behave toward this person and why? **Answer:** Paul tells them that the punishment was enough and now the church should forgive, comfort, and show their love toward the repentant sinner so that he would not be overcome with excessive sorrow.
 - b. What do you think Paul meant in verses [2:10-11](#) when he stated that expressing forgiveness was a tool to prevent being outwitted by Satan? **Answer:** Christ clearly commanded us to forgive when a person repents (Luke 17:3-5), and we are also instructed not to allow bitterness to invade our hearts (Eph. 4:31). Bitterness in the heart is a desire that the offending party never repent but instead be condemned. It is a vengeful emotion that comes from Satan and not from God. When we are unwilling to pray for God to grant repentance to an offending party, we are showing bitterness and must seek God's help to move past this to an open heart that is eager to see the person express godly grief that leads to repentance and life (2 Cor. 7:9-11). If we do not do this, we are disobeying our Lord Jesus, have given Satan a foothold in our own lives (see Eph. 4:26-27), and may cause a fellow Christian to be overwhelmed with sorrow and left in the clutches of the evil one.
2. In [2 Corinthians 3:7-18](#) Paul gives us a comparison between the "ministry of death" and the "ministry of the Spirit". Read this passage and write a brief paragraph on what you learn about these two ministries. **Answer:** The ministry of death refers to the first covenant God made with Israel to keep the Law given to Moses, especially the Ten Commandments, which God wrote on tablets of stone. It was glorious because the Law represents God's character, and Moses' face shone with this glory after being in God's presence. But this glory faded away, and the Law is condemning because it has no power to overcome sin in our hearts. Thus, Paul explains that it is the Law of sin and death for us, the letter that kills, because we are sinners by birth and practice completely unable in ourselves to live right before God. But the ministry of the Spirit is the new covenant that frees us from the Law of sin and death through Jesus Christ. God sent His only Son in human flesh to fulfill His Law and to be an offering for our sin. As God in the flesh, Jesus, was the perfect righteous sacrifice able to accept God's wrath and pay for our sins (cf. John 1:1, 1:14, John 11:17-44, 1 Cor. 15:45-57, Eph. 2:5-7, Col. 1:13-17). God demonstrated the permanency of Jesus' sacrificial work by raising him from the dead (cf. John 10:17-18, Acts 2:24, Rom. 8:10-11). Through the Holy Spirit of Jesus Christ, the ministry of righteousness causes us to be born again. God grants his new creations godly sorrow that leads to repentance, the gift of faith in Christ's work, writes His Law upon our hearts, justifies us in His sight, and seals us with the deposit of His Holy Spirit. This is the permanent glory that will never fade and through which we are being transformed bit by bit into the image of Jesus Christ, the life-giving spirit.
3. Read [2 Corinthians 4:3-7](#) and answer the questions below.
 - a. Who does the text describe as perishing and what reason does it give? **Answer:** The people who are perishing are those to whom the gospel of Jesus Christ is veiled. The god of this world (i.e., Satan) is blinding unbelievers to the truth of the good news and glory of Jesus Christ. This veil is analogous to the veil in the temple that separated the holy place from the holy of holies. When Jesus paid our penalty on the cross, God tore the veil in the temple from top to bottom signifying that the Way to him had been made through Christ Jesus. Without Jesus the veil remains over a person's heart and mind, and he or she cannot get to God. They have no payment for their sins.
 - b. Most people put their treasured possessions in a fire-proof metal container, safe, or vault. Why do you think the Holy Spirit describes us as jars of clay containing treasure? **Answer:** Human life is fragile and easily taken by sickness, accident, or violence. Moreover, as humans we tend to be fearful, lack courage, and our confidence is often shaky and dependent on what others think. Like jars of clay, we are easily destroyed. God, who cannot lie but always demonstrates the Truth, has put his treasure into fragile humans so that it will be plain to all that the power belongs to Him and not to us.
4. Because false teachers had infiltrated the Corinthian church, Paul laid out his credentials as an Apostle called directly by Jesus Christ to draw the church away from the clutches of these evil men. Most of his credentials consisted of the hardships he had endured while spreading the gospel. But in [2 Corinthians 12:2-7](#) we get a glimpse into one of his mountain top experiences. Read this passage and answer the questions below.
 - a. Paul noted he was caught up into the third heaven. Logic tells us that the first heaven is the sky we see above us (i.e., earth's atmosphere). What are the second and third heavens? (See [Genesis 1:16](#), [Psalm 19:1-3](#), and [Luke 23:43](#) for hints.) **Answer:** The second heaven would be what we refer to as outer space (i.e., stars, sun, moon, galaxies). The third heaven would be Paradise, or the place where God lives.
 - b. In [2 Corinthians 12:7](#) what was the reason the Apostle Paul gave for why God gave him a thorn in his flesh? **Answer:** Paul states that to keep him from becoming conceited and exalting himself after such a superior revelation from God, God gave Paul what he refers to as a thorn in his flesh; a messenger of Satan.

Sample Closing Prayer Verse

2 Corinthians 13:5, "Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Or do you not realize this about yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you? – unless indeed you fail to meet the test!"

Sample Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, help us to examine ourselves against your word. Search us, O God, and know our hearts. Try our thoughts and show us if there is any hurtful way in us that we may confess our sins and restore fellowship with you. Enable us to overcome quarreling, jealousy, hostility, gossip, and conceit. Do not allow us to hide our impurity but lead us in the way everlasting. We are weak but Christ Jesus, in whose name we pray, is strong. Amen.
